




Q2: Why do the shepherds embark on their journey?

Luke 2:9-11 (ESV)

9 And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with great fear. 10 And the angel said to them, "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. 11 For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord."



• CHRIST - God's anointed, handpicked emissary, who comes in God's authority to carry out His will, fulfill His promises, & establish His reign



Luke 2:13-14 (ESV)

13 And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, 14"Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!"

Luke 2:15-16 (ESV)

15 When the angels went away from them into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go over to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has made known to us." 16 And they went with haste...





Q4: Why do our travelers end up at their particular destination?

Luke 2:16-18 (ESV)

16 And they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby lying in a manger. 17 And when they saw it, they made known the saying that had been told them concerning this child. 18 And all who heard it wondered at what the shepherds told them.

Luke 2:19-20 (ESV)

19 But Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart. 20 And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

The shepherds are welcomed to BEHOLD the Christ child and the experience changes them.

Helpless and hungry, Lowly, afraid Wrapped in the chill of midwinter Comes now among us, Born into poverty's embrace New life for the world.

Who is this who lives with the lowly, Sharing their sorrows, Knowing their hunger? This is Christ, Revealed to the world In the eyes of a child, A child of the poor.

We are invited this Advent season to take whatever is causing us trepidation and release it to God.

It is safe to leave your anxiety at Jesus' feet because the gospel proclaims to us, "Behold your belovedness and behold God."

Philippians 2:4-7(ESV)

4 Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. 5 Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, 6 who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, 7 but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men.



8 And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross.

Romans 8:31-32 (ESV)

31 If God is for us, who can be against us? 32 He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?

Romans 8:35, 37 (ESV)

35 Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword? ... 37 No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us."

Be aware: beholding requires an active response.
